From the Rector. . .

The most recent Council of the Church teaches that for the laity, their mission or apostolate grows from their share in the priestly, prophetic, and royal office of Christ, and it must be "directed to the evangelization and sanctification of men and to the penetrating and perfecting of the temporal order through the spirit of the Gospel." Above all, "the success of the lay apostolate depends upon the laity's living union with Christ."

I have been a priest for 42 years. The last 24 years of my life have been spent at Mater Ecclesiae, in the Traditional Latin Mass Apostolate. I have never seen, and every priest that has visited agrees, a more vibrant group of people "directed to the evangelization and sanctification of [their brothers and sisters] and to penetrating and perfecting the temporal order though the spirit of the Gospel." This does not just apply to Mater. It is present in every Traditional Latin Mass community, so many who are here today.

Mater Ecclesiae and all of the Latin Mass communities would not exist without the faithful, persistent, prayerful, financial and constant sacrifices of the lay faithful. Mater Ecclesiae exists because of everything they did and continue to do. Their witness, their love of the Catholic Faith, their consistent and actual participation in Sunday Mass and every other liturgical event, their enthusiastic love of Our Lady, and their devotion to Our Lord have been an inspiration to me and have made my priesthood richer than I could ever have imagined. They are loyal, active Catholics who just want to live in the Church, with all the other Rites, expressing the true and good diversity of Catholic tradition.

I've said time and time again, that Our Lady watches over us and helps us in ways that we will never know until we get to heaven. She is our Queen and our Mother; we trust her and we know she will always hear our prayers. On this, our 24th Assumption Mass of Thanksgiving for the foundation of Mater Ecclesiae, we rejoice and our hearts burst with joy.

THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Belief in the Assumption of Our Lady goes back to early Christian tradition. It found expression gradually in the writings of the Fathers and in various liturgies (at Jerusalem from the 6^{th} century, at Rome from the 7^{th}).

At Jerusalem, early evidence of the feast is to be found in the pilgrimages made to what is believed to have been Our Lady's tomb. A Benedictine monastery was built near it and, later, another near the place where she died (the "Dormition"). At Constantinople, a procession was also held on the feast of the "Falling Asleep of the Mother of God". At Rome until the 16th century, the papal cortège went from the Lateran basilica to that of St. Mary Major and, like other stational processions (e.g. on Rogation days).

In the 18th century, Pope Benedict XIV declared the Assumption to be a truth that no one is permitted to doubt, but it was not then defined as a dogma. The First Vatican Council (1869-1870) was adjourned before reaching this item on its agenda. Finally, on November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII proclaimed solemnly, as a part of divine revelation, that "the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Immaculate Mother of God, at the close of her earthly career was taken up into heaven, body and soul". The time, the place or other circumstances of the Assumption are neither included in the definition nor alluded to in the Mass composed for the feast; it only emphasizes the fact of the corporal glorification and its necessary connection with the two preceding privileges of Mary: her Immaculate Conception and her divine Maternity.

This Mass sees the glorified Virgin, in the person of the Woman clothed with the sun (Apoc., Introit), in the King's Daughter in golden robes (Ps. 44, Gradual), in the Woman who, with her Son, will be victorious over the serpent (Gen., Offertory); it applies to her the praise given to Judith (Epistle); it recognizes in Mary's Assumption the fulfilling of her own prophecy in the Magnificat (Gospel). The Prayers ask that, after Mary's example, we may long for heaven (Collect, Secret), obtain the glorious resurrection (Post Communion) and enjoy everlasting bliss (Collect).

There is to be NO applause at any time, neither before, during or after Mass!

MUSIC NOTES

What is culture worth? A recent letter from a group of British luminaries in the world of arts and letters on behalf of the traditional Latin Mass insisted that this particular cultural expression is priceless. In fact, what attaches its devotees to the Latin Mass are precisely its cultural elements—the thousand and one details that produce its savor of sacrality, its sacred style. Indeed, the endurance of this attachment has proven a puzzlement to many in the Church, and seems to propound a principle that even the likes of Plato knew well before the age of Redemption: that style is not a matter of indifference and is of the greatest importance in the formation of the heart and mind. Who could argue that the conveyance of a motorcycle is of no significant difference from that of a sedan, simply because they share the same destination? Without privileging one vehicle over the other, anyone would have to admit that the style in which one travels makes a difference.

In the course of time, the Church has embraced a panoply of authentic liturgical styles. This is true for ritual expressions, as in the case of some two dozen liturgical rites that embody the Church at prayer. But it is also true of the abundant variety of authentic music styles that have enriched the Church's worship over the centuries. The music for this year's Mass of the Assumption draws liberally on this expansive patrimony.

The central work is the setting of the Mass Ordinary by Franz Schubert, the *Mass in C Major*, D. 452, written when the composer was not yet 20 years old. Like several of his other Masses, Schubert wrote the *Mass in C* for his parish church in the Lichtental district (now part of Vienna). It is likely that the young Schubert conducted the premiere in the fall of 1816. The Mass is compactly composed, but admirably lyrical throughout, with a clear

declamation of the liturgical text. Notably, the *Benedictus* we will sing tonight is not from the original 1816 version, but a revision composed by Schubert just seven weeks before his untimely death at the age of 31. While the work owes much to the Haydn brothers and Mozart, Schubert demonstrates his command of the harmonic language of the nascent Romantic generation, in which he holds pride of place. Schubert's interest in the *missae breves* of Mozart—two of whose *Church Sonatas* (K. 263 and K. 278) serve as prelude and postlude for the Mass—are confirmed by diary entries during his teenage years.

The polyphonic styles of the Renaissance are also well represented. Palestrina is rightly celebrated as the paradigm of liturgical composition. His effortless melodism as well as his imitative design is evident in the motet, *Ego sum panis vivus* (John 6:51). This communion motet echoes the language of the lively offertory by Guerrero, *Ego flos campi* (Song of Songs 2:1), which is frequently associated with the Blessed Virgin. This motet is set for eight voices in two choirs. Its dialogical framework foreshadows the style of the incipient Baroque, but also depicts the conversation between the lover and his beloved in the *Song of Songs*.

The liturgical plainchant is the cornerstone of all Western liturgical music, and the organ prelude and postlude reimagine the spirit of the chant in de Gringy's Baroque organ settings of the hymn, *Ave Maris Stella*, which is the office hymn par excellence of the Blessed Virgin Mary. These works, and all the epochs in the dappled history of Catholic sacred music, are harmonized and made coherent by the liturgical form itself. Although style is a matter of consequence, it is multifarious and far from monolithic, as the generosity of the Roman rite to human culture attests.

Sacred Music and the Liturgy

Imost no one is paying any attention to the Church's teachings on Sacred Music! This teaching must be shouted from the housetops, continuously, persistently, and strongly. It is not a peripheral issue. Since the law of prayer (lex orandi) is the law of belief (lex credendi), and since sacred music is the vessel that conveys the meaning of the words of liturgical prayer, it must be worthy and approved for its very important role. Ditties and sacro-pop can't do it and haven't been doing it. Parishes keep trying more of the same and yet the churches continue to empty. Think there is a lesson here?

Saint Pius X – Tra Le Sollecitudini - 1903

1. Sacred Music, being a complementary part of the solemn liturgy, participates in the general scope of the liturgy, which is the glory of God and the sanctification and edification of the faithful...

2. Sacred Music should consequently possess, in the highest degree, the qualities proper to the liturgy, and in particular sanctity and goodness of form, which will spontaneously produce the final quality of universality.

It must be holy, and must, therefore, exclude all profanity not only in itself, but in the manner in which it is presented by those who execute it.

It must be true art, for otherwise it will be impossible for it to exercise on the minds of those who listen to it that efficacy which the Church aims at obtaining in admitting into her liturgy the art of musical sounds.

Sacrosanctum Concilium

In the earthly liturgy we take part in a foretaste of that heavenly liturgy which is celebrated in the holy city of Jerusalem toward which we journey as pilgrims, where Christ is sitting at the right hand of God, a minister of the holies and of the true tabernacle...

The musical tradition of the universal Church is a treasure of inestimable value, greater even than that of any other art. The main reason for this pre-eminence is that, as sacred song united to the words, it forms a necessary or integral part of the solemn liturgy.

The Church acknowledges Gregorian chant as specially suited to the Roman liturgy: therefore, ... it should be given first place in liturgical services. (principem locum obtineat.)

I would like to conclude my comments by saying something about actual participation in the Sacred Liturgy. We primarily and most importantly participate by internally joining ourselves to the Sacrifice offered at the altar. We participate by listening to the glorious music provided by the choir. We join with them by being beneficiaries of the talent they have received from God. We sing the parts of the Mass designated for the congregation. We adore, kneel, listen, pray and abandon ourselves to this timeless, holy, universal art at the service of God's sovereign majesty. We are uplifted from our mundane and trouble filled existence into the sacred and eternal presence of God-made-flesh. We worship God and God fills us with His grace. We honor the Blessed Virgin Mary and she perpetually intercedes for us. We truly partake in the foretaste of that heavenly liturgy toward which we journey as pilgrims.

May God bless you and Mary keep you.



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The schola completes the Introit during the incensation of the Altar and the choir begins the Kyrie. After the Kyrie the Celebrant returns to the middle of the altar and intones the Gloria. The Deacon and Sub Deacon join the Celebrant at the altar to pray the Gloria. They then return to the Sedilia until the choir completes the Gloria, at which time the Celebrant returns to the altar to chant the Collect.
